Lesson Title	Olympic Careers	
Suggested Lesson Time	One 40-minute class period	
Lesson Objectives	 8.1.1 Explore a range of resources related to one's information needs, personal interests and well-being (State Library Standard). At the end of the session, students will describe tasks completed by 10 Olympic careers at or above 7/10 as measured by the completion of the Olympic Jobs and Careers matching sheet. At the end of the session, students will demonstrate evidence of career exploration by completing the Olympic Career Fact sheet at or above 11/15 correct as measured by the included assessment rubrics. 8.4.1 Independently use information from a variety of sources for academic subjects and personal knowledge (State Library Standard). At the end of the session, students will demonstrate ability to use the internet to research careers using the HirePaths resources as demonstrated by formative evaluation notes kept by the teacher.

Introduction

How are you going to obtain the students' attention and redirect them toward the lesson topic?

As students enter, the Olympic music at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=MCqUESCoB1w can be playing to build anticipation for the theme. An optional shelf display or bulletin board can highlight the excitement of the Olympic games. If possible, display many sports-themed books, flags and medals.

After students are seated, show the video at https://olympics.com/ioc/careers/who-we-are.

An optional activity is to read bits of a book called *Choose a Career Adventure at the Olympics* (Bright Futures Press: Choose a Career Adventure) by Kelly. This could also be saved for the end of the session. The book can be obtained from the Kansas Interlibrary Loan system or purchased.

Information

• Materials to be presented

Discuss the Olympic careers video by asking questions such as:

- --Have you ever considered the amount of work and behind-the-scenes management that goes on at big events like the Olympics?
- --What other behind-the scenes careers might there be at the Olympics?
- --Which of the featured jobs seems most difficult? Surprising? Interactive?

Hand out the Olympic Jobs and Careers matching page. Opt to have students complete the activity on their own, or allow them to pair up. Display the sheet on the screen using the link if desired. Review the matching answers after completion.

After completion, ask students to choose one of the careers from the Olympic Jobs and Careers matching page and move forward into deeper career exploration using HirePaths resources and the instructions on the Olympic Career Fact Sheet.

Guide students to the HirePaths website by demonstrating how to click through the links using a display screen if desired. Allow time for students to move through the activity using their individual devices. Support students by circulating among them, providing feedback and assisting.

Collect completed matching pages and fact sheets for assessment.

Key Points

• Demonstration points

Many individuals with a variety of careers are needed to make a huge event like the Olympics run smoothly.

Young people may not have considered the options for working at this and other exciting public events.

HirePaths resources can help students explore a variety of careers.

Careers such as security officer, logistics coordinator, catering manager, sports doctor, digital marketer, waste management specialist, telecommunications installer, paramedic, civil engineer and cashier require differing skill sets and education, but all must work together to facilitate successful events.

Researching a particular career can help students understand key concepts such as soft skills and career clusters.



Summary

How are you going to summarize the lesson?

After students have completed all activities with support from the facilitator, students may use remaining time to explore other careers on the HirePaths website, compare their chosen careers to those of classmates, ask questions of the teacher, or continue discussion of the Olympic Games. Gold medals may be handed out as a fun follow-up and way of making the activity more memorable.

Student Activities

What are students going to practice while obtaining feedback and direction from the teacher?

- Students will practice identifying specific jobs based on a written description.
- Students will practice using a career website to research a particular job.
- Students will practice following specific directions to conduct inquiry using the web.
- Students will practice responding to other students and adults in a collaborative environment.

Student Assessment

How are you going to ensure students have the knowledge or skills taught in this lesson?

Formative assessment will occur during the lesson as the teacher responds to student questions and discussion. Observational assessment will be a part of this process.

Summative assessment will occur when teachers evaluate the written work demonstrating research skills.

I ensure the safety and security of people at the Olympics, including monitoring crowds, responding to safety incidents, and patrolling venues.



I provide medical care to Olympic athletes, officials, and trainers. This includes treating injuries and illness, along with maintaining health standards at The Games.



I design and implement waste management procedures in the Olympic host city, including recycling and removal operations.



I produce various forms of digital marketing media, such as videos, podcasts, advertisements, and social media posts to promote the branding of the Olympics.



I set up devices that carry signals, like cell phone equipment and internet routers on site at The Games. I maintain communication technology at Olympic venues.



I respond to emergency calls, perform medical services, and transport patients to medical facilities among athletes, Olympic workers, spectators, and others.



I process payments from customers purchasing goods and services at Olympic venues, including souvenir shops, restaurants, and supply stores.



I oversee food and beverage service at Olympic venues, including planning menus and hiring cook and wait staff.
